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# BALSAM LAKE MAP THROW RAISES OVER \$20,000 FOR COVID RELIEF AND THE BLHA

There's going to be a familiar sight in cabins all around Balsam this Summer: A beautiful Balsam Lake Map throw made by the Faribault Woolen Mill. It began as a casual conversation I had with Dave Turbenson, a man who does so much for our lake community. What if we created a Balsam Lake map blanket and the Balsam Lake Homeowners' Association sold them as fundraiser for COVID relief in Polk County? As a board member at the Faribault Woolen Mill, I knew what a great fundraiser a blanket could be. With his typical unbridled enthusiasm, Dave took it to the board and they made it happen. The BLHA was able to raise over \$20,000 for Kinship of Polk County with a smaller portion going to all the good things the BLHA provides for the lake, like our water safety patrol and fireworks.



More than just a fundraiser, the Balsam Lake throw is a true keepsake, made to last

for generations. The map was designed by former Balsam cabin owner, Lori Henson. Crafted from soft merino wool with a touch of cotton, it's perfect draped over a couch, around the firepit or on the boat. The Faribault Woolen Mill is a true American treasure. They began making wool blankets at the end of the Civil War, made millions of blankets for our soldiers



during WWI and WWII and still supply blankets to the US Navy and West Point. Second and third generation craftspeople weave the blankets in the mill's "new" building, built in 1896 on the banks of the Cannon River in Faribault, Minnesota. The mill is the oldest manufacturing company in Minnesota and one of the last true vertical mills left in America. Faribault gets raw wool, dyes it, spins it into yarn, weaves and finishes it all under one roof. The mill provides more than 100 jobs in Faribault and has retail stores at the mill, in Linden Hills in South Minneapolis, and downtown Excelsior.

**The BLHA sold 230 of the map throws.** And knowing that there will likely be many people who missed the initial order, Jerry and Trish Szykulski, owners of the new Hopsack Goods store in downtown Balsam volunteered to stock an

additional thirty and donate the profits back to the BHLA.

Hopsack will be opening in May and will offer, gifts, clothing, home goods, specialty food items and more. **The BLHA would like to give a huge thanks** to Angie, Ryan and their crew at Balsam Lake Hardware for storing and distributing the throws. Also, a special thanks to Terry Hauer for coordinating the orders and delivering the throws to the hardware store. 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## THE HISTORY OF BALSAM LAKE (OR AT LEAST OBSERVATIONS OF MY LITTLE CORNER OF IT)





*First off, as I am about to prove without a shadow of a doubt,* that I am NOT a writer. For the most part, I've been a public speaker most of my life, so I write like I talk. Extra commas, italicized words (and way too many incorrectly placed parenthesis) to emulate my voice inflection as if I were reading this aloud. When I was in radio, I READ the news. Never wrote it. I also tend to "mansplain" things too much. Feel free to read, this in Morgan Freeman or Sam Elliot's voice. I am...

Growing up, I thought that I had lived in Balsam Lake for decades, despite not being decades old at the time. I've noticed through the years that time speeds up. Elementary school took 15 years, High School about 7, my 4-year Military hitch about 5 and the last 38 years took only 4 years. I only lived in B.L. for 15 years. The shoes that I am wearing are older than that. It really hit me when I had moved out on my own and was stationed in Colorado Springs. I asked my

Mom to send me all my Christmas ornaments for my 1st solo tree. A family tradition

was to do an ornament exchange each year. In my mind, I should have had two UPS deliveries worth of ornaments. A shoe box arrived with more protective stuffing than ornaments. When questioned, my mom pointed out that I was only 18, therefore there were only 18 ornaments...

*For me, Balsam Lake was founded in about 1967-1970.* We lived in a home we rented from Doris McKenzie. Dad (Roger Anderson) started his new job working for the Village Garage. My Mom (Patricia Anderson) taught 1st grade in Milltown. That saved me from any freshman hazing in high school as the seniors all had Mom as their teacher and had a good experience, so they left me alone. She eventually became the K-12 librarian for Unity. We lived in Wanderoos until 1969, and she commuted to Milltown but dropped me off in Balsam Lake, where I stayed with Rosie and Al Anderson as well as Duane and Dorene Hendrickson while she taught.

If I could travel back in time to chat with people that I grew up with, it would be with people that invited me into their living rooms while I was collecting for my newspaper route, or if it was inclement weather during deliveries. I have so many more questions at this age. I knew that Jim Moore was a retired Polk County Sheriff - but I didn't know Katherine Moore was the 1st woman sheriff in the state! They rotated the post as you could only be a sheriff for two years at a time. To me, she was the town librarian - but I also thought that was a more important job than sheriff anyway! And Helen and Millard Freeman. They would give me a cup of cocoa or ice water in their "Mansion." He let me use his rifle (a giant, octagon barrel .30/30) for my 1st deer season. It was bigger than me. Little did I know that Helen was the Balsam Lake historian, and a Tuttle. When I was that age, what did I care about history? Darn.

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# PAVING THE PATH TO WISCONSIN

*I am fascinated by history* and the stories that make it come alive. So naturally the article in last summer's Shoreline, "1000 miles to Polk County" piqued my interest. It highlighted Richard Pearson, one of Polk county's original settlers who traveled 1000 miles from Quebec, Canada to our lake area.

The Pearson family history is similar to many others of the time including my own, though they settled a little

further down the Apple river. The Parent, Parnell and Belisle families all came from the same area in Canada staking claims on their farms at the mouth of the Apple river and in the Star Prairie area in 1850 and 1851.

**But why would so many families travel** such a great distance? In the early and mid-1800's the opportunities for employment and larger parcels of land were limited in the St. Lawrence River area of Quebec where they lived. The English rulers restricted the families to small parcels (40 acres) of land making it difficult to maintain their families. It was also hard to find jobs in the area because of the new arrivals from Europe. They had heard stories of the rivers, prairies and massive tree stands to be harvested. The growing opportunities of employment and farmland in this haven of "L'ouisconsin" offered these men and their families a chance for a bright future in the "west."

At this time the United States and Canadian governments were involved with immigration companies organizing consignments and expeditions to encourage the settlement of areas in the west. These expeditions typically started on the Great Lakes waterways as the beginning of their routes to the west.

These trips were typically long and dangerous and sometimes

taking as long as three months for those men and women reaching for their dreams. *With the development of the fur trade* in the 1700's and early 1800's the Brule-St. Croix river route was well

known to these Canadians. So this was the route that many of the early settlers took as they traveled down the St. Croix to the area. Later the routes were generally from the Fox River in Green Bay or the Illinois River from



Chicago. Eventually they worked their way to the Mississippi and up to the St Croix to the Apple River, Osceola and St. Croix Falls area.

**Logging boomed** with the influx of the new settlers. The first lumber mill was established on the St. Croix river 15 miles north of Stillwater in 1836, and in 1840 a mill was established further up the river in St. Croix Falls. By 1850 there were 15 mills along the St. Croix providing many jobs at the mills and in the logging camps. Soon after there were two mills on the Apple River and of course the Lenroot mill on the Balsam Branch. These mills and logging camps offered a source of income for many of these hard-working men as they established their homesteads and developed their farms. During this time the Federal government would allow settlers to place a claim on up to 120 acres. The only stipulation for full ownership was that the settlers had to live on the land for five years and to show

improvements to their parcel.

**The U.S. Homestead Act** was passed in 1862 with the goal of accelerating the settlement of lands in Polk county and all over the west. Many of the original French Canadian settlers would continue to send for their families in the coming decades, joining the early Swedish, Norwegian, Danish and German families in the area.

The history of the area is that of the stories of these early families. The Pearson, Parent, Parnell, Belisle families and perhaps yours all traveled great distances and worked hard to chase their dreams.
